Meeting called to order by Chairwoman Debbie Cunningham at 12:06 p.m.

(2) Consent Agenda

Motion to approve minutes 0111.22. Motion to approve made by Warren Bloom, seconded by Ed Webman. Motion passes unanimously.

(3) Staff Updates

Lakes Management - Staff gave Gloria a tour of the chain and other lakes through out the City. She was very impressed with the urbanized lakes in such pristine conditions. Wonderful water quality, clarity, and diverse aquatic plant species. Monthly water samples were collected and sent to Orange County. Lake Maitland received their last 35 grass carp stocked with the total being 335. Staff is waiting to hear back from St. John's River management district on the permitting of the Venetian and Fern canals. The City receive ARPA funding the City Commission identified spending \$100k for dredging the canals to help with tourism. Board asked when the last dredging was done. Staff informed the board the last complete dredging was done in 2002 with minor dredging done when the canal walls were re-done. Staff discussed some waterway cleanup options to assist with litter being dropped in the canals. Staff is working to re-establish the lakes newsletter with positive messaging back out to the residents. Replacement buoys have all been installed through out the City. The grass carp barrier was installed in Lake Berry and FWC application is being made to stock more grass carps. Staff has applied for new permits from FWC for aquatic vegetation treatment in the chain and Lake Baldwin to replace existing permits.

Stormwater Management - Staff presented a map of stormwater treatment areas with the types of treatments used. All outfalls that are 24" or larger are within the treatment systems. Lake Shelton has some inhouse baffle boxes designed that go around that lake. Don gave some examples of the CDS units, Baffle Boxes, and exfiltration storm treatment systems. Don shared some construction pictures from the stormwater treatment system under hole #3 at the golf course. Staff gave an update on the Grant application for Nicolet Pond. The application has gone through the legislature now has a house bill number assigned to it. Staff hopes to get 150K from the state legislature for the project.

SAP-2021-0043 1013 Temple Grove - Request to install riprap by Renee Gilmore

Staff was made aware right before the Lakes and Waterways meeting that the riprap had already been installed. Staff was planning to approve the application with some stipulations. Staff wanted to keep the riprap placement to just where the shore was eroding and not within the knees of the cypress trees. Staff recommended the board approve the application and request the applicant get an after the fact permit with the caveat that staff will go out and inspect the site again and determine if the riprap can be removed from within the knees and around the trees without damaging them. If the riprap can be removed safely that will be a stipulation for the after the fact permit. Board asked if the placement of the rocks was a concern to the cypress trees. Staff stated they don't believe the rock placement is an issue to the trees and knees. After further discussion; motion made by Robert Bendick to not approve application, seconded by Warren Bloom, motion to no approve application passed unanimously.

- Staff inspected the site on President’s Day and our Urban Forester thought removing riprap would cause more damage than leaving it.
- Contractor agreed to mitigate by increasing shoreline planting.

Sec. 58-368. - Fertilizer regulations.

- (a) *Adoption of county regulations by reference.* Chapter 15, article XVII of the Orange County Code, as amended from time to time, governing fertilizer use shall apply within the boundaries of the city. Further amendments to chapter 15, article XVII of the Orange County Code shall be automatically incorporated into this section by reference unless the city commission elects to opt out of such amendments by adopting a resolution or ordinance so stating. Orange County and relevant personnel and agents thereof shall have the authority to enforce and administer chapter 15, article XVII of the Orange County Code as incorporated herein within the boundaries of the city. The city and relevant personnel and agents thereof shall have the authority to enforce and administer chapter 15, article XVII of the Orange County Code as incorporated herein within the boundaries of the city using any enforcement mechanism available under this section, other provisions of city Code, county Code, or by law. It shall be unlawful for any person to violate any provision of this section, or any provision of any resolution enacted pursuant to the authority of this section.
- (b) *City enforcement.* Every city code compliance or code enforcement officer is authorized to enforce the provisions of this section. Any person who violates any provision of this section, or any provision of any resolution enacted pursuant to the authority of this section, shall be subject to the following penalties if enforcement action is taken by the city or its employees or agents:
- (1) First violation: Written notice and warning;
 - (2) Second violation: Fine of \$50.00 except for commercial applicators it shall be \$500.00.
 - (3) Third and subsequent violations: Fine of \$100.00 except that for commercial applicators it shall be \$750.00.

In addition to the enforcement provisions provided in subsection (b), the city may avail itself of any other legal or equitable remedy available to it, including, but not limited to, injunctive relief or the initiation of code enforcement proceedings with the remedies as prescribed by F.S. ch. 162, in the enforcement of any provision of this section or any provision of any resolution enacted pursuant to the authority of this section. Any person violating this section shall be held liable for all costs incurred by the city in connection with enforcing this section, or any resolution enacted pursuant to the authority of this section, including, but not limited to, attorneys' fees and costs.

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Orange County's tougher fertilizer rules aim to protect lakes, wildlife

Faced with evidence of polluted lakes and dead manatees, Orange County commissioners toughened restrictions on lawn fertilizers Tuesday, banning summertime use of products with nitrogen and phosphorus blamed for poisoning county waterways.

The unanimous vote followed two hours of discussion during which environmentalists pleaded with the board to join 16 other Florida counties and more than 100 municipalities which have enacted rules to limit the flow of turf chemicals into public waters.

The new rules go into effect June 1.

"We all know our springs are turning green. We have fish kills. We have manatee deaths," said James Helmers, a retired Orlando emergency-medicine doctor representing the Friends of the Wekiva River, an area environmental group. "The care of non-native lawn grass, I think, is more environmentally damaging than the problem with boa constrictors is in the Everglades."

The new rules also eliminate an existing exemption for commercial lawn-care specialists, who lobbied against the change.

"We know what we're doing," said Billy Butterfield, an Orlando landscape professional. "We're highly trained at it. We're going to put out the right amount of chemical, the right amount of nutri-

ents, at the right rates and the right place at the right time."

He appealed to the board to treat commercial fertilizer applicators as county rules treat golf courses, which are exempt.

Julie Bortles of Orange County's Environmental Protection Division said county officials discussed exemption options with researchers at the University of Florida which provides best management training for golf course professionals tasked with keeping the links green.

"We felt that requiring training for them was the best way to go," Bortles said.

The county has about 30 active golf courses.

The ordinance also grants exemptions to "bona fide agricultural farms" and sports turf areas at parks or athletic fields.

Orange County Mayor Jerry Demings called the ordinance "one of many steps ... to keep pollutants out of waterbodies."

The restrictions are similar but not identical to rules in surrounding Brevard, Lake and Seminole counties.

Most, for instance, prohibit fertilizing lawns with nitrogen within 15 feet of water. Orange County's setback is 25 feet.

The rules are intended to cut the amount of fertilizer leaching into the groundwater or washing off residential lawns, driveways and sidewalks and into lakes and rivers, where polluting nutrients spawn globs of algae, killing off fish and other wildlife.

"Our lakes are in bad shape," said Eric Rollings, former chairman of the Soil and Water Commission

and a vocal advocate for the tighter restrictions. "About a third of the county's lakes are impaired to the extent you can't swim in them or eat the fish you catch."

Katrina Shadix, executive director of Bear Warriors United, held up poster-size photos in commission chambers showing dead manatees in Brevard County's Indian River Lagoon, where pollution has eradicated seagrass, a staple of the marine mammal's diet.

She blamed chemicals in weed-killers and fertilizer.

Sue Gilman, co-president of the League of Women Voters, said the problems extend beyond Orange County.

"Our Florida waters are overnutrified," she said. "This is evident statewide as we witness red tide off our west coast, manatees starving on the east coast and, locally, slime in our precious springs. People love their green grass, however, that's a fact."

Orange County last updated its fertilizer rules in July 2017 when the board directed staff to collect data on water quality.

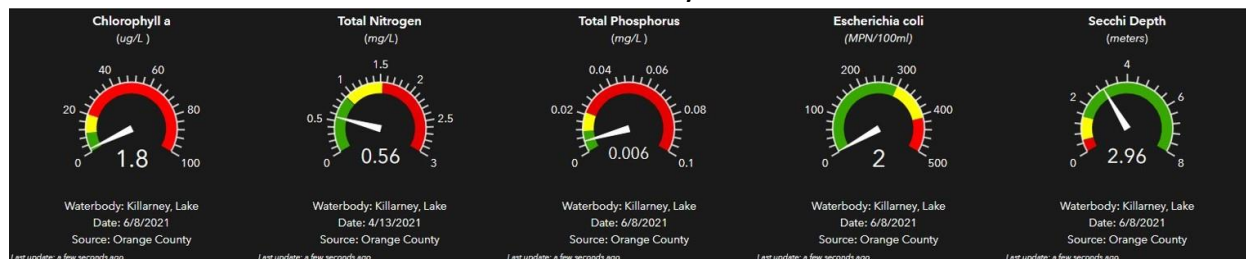
Studies completed last year showed high levels of fertilizer nitrates in groundwater and increases during the rainy season.

The summer ban on fertilizer with nitrogen runs from June 1 through Sept. 30 — when heavy rains are more common.

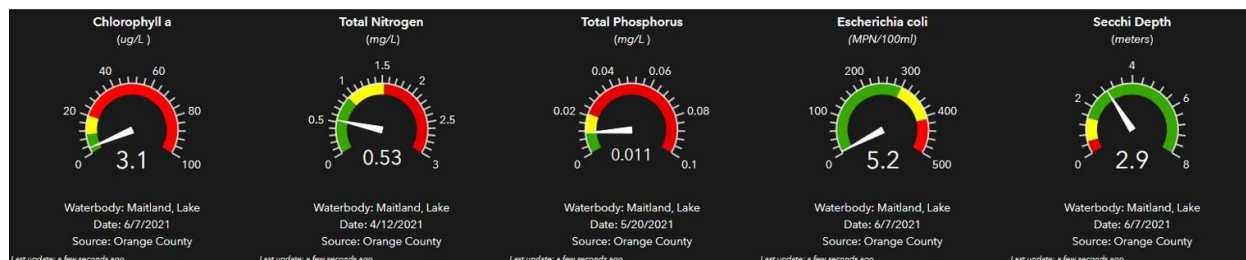

Orange County Water Quality Dashboard Comparisons

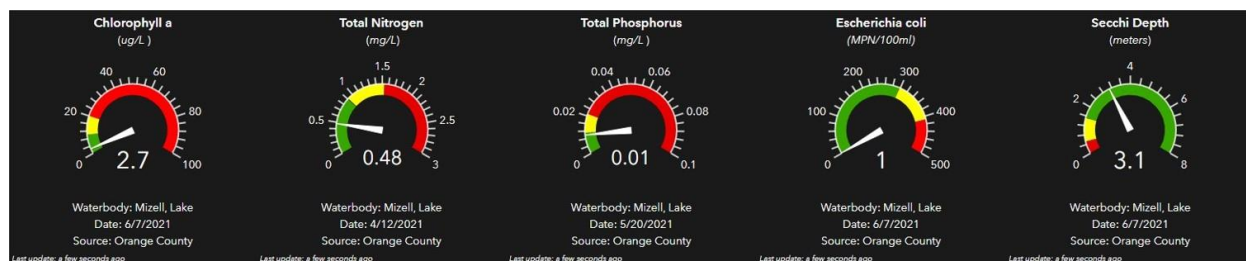

Greetings Lake Sue residents,

Lake Sue is currently under a cautionary advisory for possible harmful algal bloom (HAB). Due to reports received from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's hotline, laboratory samples from Lake Sue have been collected and is pending. The City of Winter Park Lakes Division is advising residents now of this cautionary advisory. The samples test for cyanobacteria that may contain toxins. If a specific level of toxins is found, the Health Department will release an alert for the HAB occurring.

Until the results are determined, it is advisable for residents and pets to avoid recreating within areas where a bloom is present. For more information about the bloom occurring on your lake, including Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs), status of samples, and health concerns, please access the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's algae dashboard at floridadep.gov/AlgalBloom.
